

The Road

Tony Rodis had a meeting with the Forestry Department, GMW in late November with the hope to reenergise the project and look to progress our first goal of getting the first corner fixed. While the meeting was positive and was well represented by all parties, the quest for action continues to be drawn out. Everybody remains committed, but budgets and funding continue to be a sticking point.

Member Barges

The Board is currently working through some changes with the insurance and liability on all the club barges. At the General Meeting held in November, and in order to be able to allow members to continue to use the members' barges, a motion was tabled and past. The motion *"members driving the barges being responsible for damage caused to any property while driving the barges"*. The motion was passed unanimously by all members in attendance. The exact wording of the motion can be found in the minutes from the General Meeting should anybody be interested.

As a postscript to information provided at the general meeting and as a result of continued discussions, the Board have unanimously voted that while discussions around insurance and liability remain ongoing, members' barges *should not be used for recreational purposes* (booze cruises, site outside the immediate area of the club, etc.). A communication will be sent to members confirming this.

Defibs and Fire boxes

Brod Helmers has recently refitted fire boxes to each marina and defibs on the top of the boxes at the start of each marina. Unfortunately, during the most recent windstorm, as mentioned above we lost the Defib from D Marina. We will replace it but will need to look for a more suitable place to put it.

We are hoping to have a demonstration of how to operate the defibs at Darlingford Day. In the meantime, a video link was sent to all members that demonstrates how to use them should you need to.

I look forward to seeing everybody on the water.



HOPING TO EXIST - DONALD MALCOMBE ATKINSON

Following Don's retirement from the Board, Luke Brinksma sat down with him for a little chat and he provides the following bio.

Born on 13/10/1941 to an infantry soldier Archibald, originally from Glasgow who immigrated to Australia in 1912 aged 3, and Olive born 1914 in Maryborough Victoria, "Donny" was the 2nd eldest of 4 boys, Phillip (1940 dec.), Donny, Robert (1944), Geoffrey (1949 dec.). From 1947 the family lived in barracks at Seymour in married quarters. The hospital wing (60'x20') they were placed in *"required Dad to build the internal walls to form a living home space"*. Archibald served in the transport division teaching and testing soldiers to drive all motor vehicles, motorbikes, trucks, tanks etc.

Olive was a dressmaker, but became a stay-at-home mother once the kids came along as was the thing back then. Donny junior schooled at Seymour State School #547 and High schooled at Seymour High School, matriculating 6th form in 1956 as a prefect. "I was not interested in sport; however I did help with the running races as a marshal and learnt to score for cricket and goal umpire for Footy. I never learned to swim – still can't! We used to have swimming lessons in the Goulbourn River, but I found a shallow section I could walk across and sit on the island in the middle whilst the rest of the class completed their swims - Atkinson being at the start of the alphabet I was always early in the water and the teacher distracted with the rest of the class".

After High School Donny got his first job with Commercial Banking Company Sydney (CBC) in Seymour where he spent about 12 months as a clerk.

1957 brought the family to Preston, where Donny remains to this day in the family home. Around this time Don started work at Sands & McDougall Printers and Stationers (famous for making Invicta exercise books) as a clerk where he remained until 1965.

1962 bought Tenpin Bowling to Australia, and as an avid reader and interested party to this new sport. Donny purchased shares in Bowling Centres Holdings, whom built the first Bowling Centre in Hawthorn - 20 lanes, which would play 5 per lane – 100 bowlers at a time – Donny paid his 5/- (5 shillings) waited 8hrs for his first bowl and was hooked. This became a regular Sunday event. When the inaugural meeting came up, Donny was invited to join the committee of Coburg Bowl & the National Bowling federation, which formed as the A.T.B.C (Australian Tenpin Bowling Congress). In 1964 Preston Bowl opened and Donny promptly joined the more local club. In 1965 through his membership in A.T.B.C. Donny was invited to join Golden Bowl Camberwell as Assistant Manager and subsequently ran Melbourne Championship bowling events to great success.

Donny's Dad Archibald, passed from a heart attack at home in 1973.

Time passed and in 1980 Donny took a position with National Sporting Body as the National Coaching Director and training lane Inspectors. Bowling lanes had to comply to 1/40,000" tolerance to be match compliant. Through this role Donny was invited to travel Asia, Europe and America. "On one trip with the National Executive Director, we were to fly to Asia and America. The ED asked me – it's a long flight – if you are happy to pay the difference, we can fly 1st class? "Of course", was my reply and off we went in the lap of luxury". Why recall this story – well, "the leg from London to New York was on Concorde!"

In the late 80's Donny was asked to serve on the board for Disabled Tenpin National Championships as Tournament Director. A role he held for the next 27 years. During this same period The Golden Bowl was decommissioned, and with it the Golden Bowl Sportsmen's Club that Donny had been President of for 50 years was to be wound up. The accrued funds from 20 years of running Bingo was to be distributed to the remaining members, so Donny organised a 28 day around Australia cruise for them, all fares and food covered. In 2011 Donny was recognised by the NSO for participating in 50 consecutive National Tenpin Bowling Championships.

1999 saw Donny join the ATO call centre as Australia introduced ABN and GST, eventually moving into the superannuation division. Retirement finally found Donny in 2011 at 70



LITHIUM BATTERIES EXPLAINED

(Submitted by David Cox, houseboat Shilo, A Marina)

Are you considering upgrading your old lead acid, AGM or Calcium batteries to Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePo4)? If so, there is important information that you need to know.

Let's start with what LiFePo4 means, it's the chemistry name of the minerals that the cells are made from. Li: Lithium, Fe: Iron, Po4: Phosphate

Not all Lithium batteries are the same, there's A or B grade, 2000, 4000, 6000 cycle and then there are pouch, cylindrical and prismatic cells, passive and active balancers, series/parallel, Bluetooth, Inverter and PC connectivity.

The question is, what do you really need?



12V, 300Ah Lithium battery in a plastic case.

Pouch cells are compact and are great at fitting in confined spaces, but fragile when not in their casing and they also have a shorter cycle life, mostly between 500 and 1000 cycles. They are mainly used in mobile phones, tablets and EV's, etc. However,

An AGM battery melt down. I am unaware of the cause but it's likely a charging issue. This just highlights that all batteries can fail when not adequately protected. A quality Lithium battery's BMS helps to protect itself from failure.

some companies use them in their storage batteries as they are cheaper to manufacture.

Prismatic and cylindrical cells are more robust, have better thermal qualities and have a longer cycle life. B grade cells may be second hand or just not perform as they should and can be around 2,000 - 3,000 cycles. A grade cells have been manufactured to a higher specification and can be in excess of 8,000 cycles. Prismatic cells are more common, they can be cylindrical but are usually rectangular shaped and are more easily packaged into a battery case.

Now let's explain cycle life. A full cycle is from fully charged to a fully discharged state and in reality, this doesn't occur very often. So, for example;

If you have a 100Ah LiFePo4 battery that was only discharged by 20Ah and then recharged to its full state again, then you could do this 5 times before one full cycle has occurred. Therefore, cycle life is conditional to the individual application and how deeply the battery is discharged. There is a real chance that a quality LiFePo4 battery may last longer than we will.

Let's get technical. Most LiFePo4 batteries are made up of individual cells, for example in a 12V battery there are 4 and they have a nominal voltage of 3.2V each. A 24V battery has 8 cells and so on.... And it is critical that these cells are all charged correctly. Their voltage needs to be the same to get optimal performance from the battery, this is called balancing and is controlled down to just a few millivolts.

Every LiFePo4 battery needs to be controlled by an electronic device called a Battery Management System, or BMS as it is commonly referred to and this not only balances the cells, but also monitors charge and discharge voltages and currents. It is what protects the cells from extreme temperature, overcharge and discharge, etc.

There are mainly two types of BMS and these are either passive or active balancing. Balancing occurs as the battery nears its full state of charge and is controlled down to about 10mv, most passive balancers will struggle to achieve this low tolerance and some may not even achieve a balance at all. This will affect battery performance and its life.

LiFePo4 battery performance is controlled by its lowest voltage cell. So, a poorly performing cell will affect the whole batteries performance.

To series, or not to series - this is a good question.

With lead acid and AGM batteries you would always series smaller voltage high-capacity cells to achieve your desired voltage and parallel was problematic and shouldn't be done.



years of age. He bought a 27' 5th wheeler and travelled to Darwin for 3 months of the Melbourne winter for the next 10 years

1964 was the Japan summer Olympics, and 3 of Donny's friends learned to water ski whilst holidaying. On their return they convinced Donny to join them in buying a run-a-bout, and on Pikes Reservoir Victoria they learned to ski followed by a BBQ at the Plough Inn, Melton on the way home. Soon finding better locations like Metcalf Pool on the Bendigo Road, and eventually Lake Eildon. "2 Long necks per mate" looked after the thirst in those days. "During Easter we would hire an 8-berth houseboat and skiing and drinking was our lot." As they improved their skiing so did their thirst, and it was decided a more permanent arrangement was required to accommodate the drinking (so's not to drive drunk) so Donny and 3 of his mates purchased a caravan and had it placed at Eildon Caravan Park. 1976 saw Donny and another friend purchase an unnamed houseboat, subsequently named PAD (Pissed and Drunk), but very soon after, the friend found love and Don bought out his mate's share and was the proud owner of PAD (#1) a 47'x16' boat located at Jews. Donny entered the newly formed Lake Eildon Recreational Club (along with DWBC Life member Stuart Steer) and found mooring on a swing moor where the current poo barge is located. When DWBC formed

the water level was such the marinas needed to push out and Don was in the way – he was therefore invited to take a marina and soon after (2000) purchased his marina pen for \$17000, \$500 joining fee and a \$160 sub fee?? The lease was \$2400 p/a. In 2009 Maurie Callinan invited Donny to join the board, and in his 1st year he was elevated to Vice Chairman holding that position for 7 years. In 2018 Donny took on the portfolio of Insurance and in 2010 also found a new role as Iceman.

Donny has achieved 2 x W.O.M.A.N (walking of marina at night) awards, the first whilst mopping his back deck and becoming tangled in the mop. The 2nd he does not recall.....

He was also the recipient of our Delia Award in 2016.

Donny dated a few times in his early life, but never found "the one" and many night shifts limited his social availability.

When asked what his greatest joy has been, Donny answered "Meeting so many lovely people from so many varied backgrounds. Peter and Mark are my life best friends, both of whom I met at the Golden Bowl"

When asked what's next, I nearly wet myself (and found the title to this bio) when Donny very matter of factly stated "*I simply wish to continue to exist*".

"I don't drink at home as there is no one to limit the intake. My Knees are failing me, but otherwise I am in good health."

When I asked Don what advice he would give anyone he replied: "Enjoy your friendships, I have a certificate from the Baxter and Steer families that says they adopted me. Friendship is everything."



One poor performing battery will affect them all. But with LiFePo4 it's the opposite and batteries can be parallelled, this is due to the electronic BMS that is integral to all LiFePo4 batteries.



Lithium cells connected in series to make 12V, an active BMS is on the end.

So, you can parallel them to increase your amp hour capacity and some batteries will link together with a data cable as well as to your inverter for even more accurate discharging, charging and monitoring of the batteries.

Communication, do we need it? It's great to see the state of your batteries and knowing whether you need to 'actively' do something about their

state of charge. Most BMS's will tell you accurately how many amp hours have been used and how many are left, along with cycle life and some other useful information.

Most Inverters these days will link electronically with a quality BMS and this helps to maintain and charge the battery as efficiently as possible. Bluetooth monitoring can be a convenient way to view the battery status, but only while you are in range.

So how safe are LiFepo4 batteries? By now everyone has heard that Lithium batteries can catch fire. This is true, but it is most likely a Lithium-Ion battery that has done this, these can be found in toys like hoverboards, scooters, ebikes, vapes and some EV cars, etc.

Most importantly it is a fact that all batteries can be dangerous, they have enormous amounts of stored energy and in fact I have experienced a lead acid battery that exploded in front of me. This was quite scary and covered me in sulfuric acid.

Lithium Ion is not LiFepo4 and LiFePo4 is more stable and deemed to be much safer than Lithium Ion. A LiFepo4 batteries BMS has safety features like temperature sensing, maximum charge and discharge current as well as voltage protection. This not only helps protect the battery from damage, it helps to make it safer.

I hope this helps you make an informed decision before considering upgrading to a LiFepo4 battery
