Over the winter our Facilities team has been busy. The crane barge, maintenance shed, extended carparking, all major projects completed – which I am sure Matt will go into detail about. Supported by various members, this work is testament to our community coming together to achieve great outcomes.

Back of house, Melanie Farley and her finance team have been working toward tidying up our accounts, finalising EOFY budgets and bringing processes to streamline our business end as we move forward.

Nick Bodi has been toiling away creating a program to track and certify insurance details, ensuring we are all protected against incidents and accidents. All members being reminded insurance of all your watercraft is part of your contractual obligations at DWBC.

Tony Rodis continues to fight for the road improvements with the first bend scheduled for tarmacking mid-November. Tony has been wonderfully supported by Mark and Deb Patman, who have delivered very high-quality information, water samples and air quality propaganda to support our ongoing efforts toward forcing our council/government/ water board to get this roadwork done.

Brod Helmers, now officially "Commodore Brod" has had an immediate impact in resurrecting the Social Committee with improved participation from members as

each event came off. Margie Elliott continues to support Brod and our club as she has always. Brod remains a one man show in this endeavour, something I would hope will gain support from the members – the Social Committee is your face of Darlingford – your social scene, please help/join the committee to support Brod.

Megan Taylor has run her race and will step away from Secretary with Caroline Schmidt taking on the role. The Secretary role is by far the most important role within the board, ensuring our compliances, and mandatory reporting is kept up to date. Do you know that:

Darlingford, named for Sir Charles Darling KCB Governor of Victoria, was located at the junctions of the Big and Goulburn Rivers when gold was discovered locally. It housed seven hotels, five policeman, a log gaol, shops, post office and a small school. The town was flooded when construction of Sugarloaf Reservoir took place between 1915 and 1929 – the precursor to Lake Eildon as we know it now. One of the hotels,

The Carriers Arms Hotel, was locally reputed as a favourite watering hole for Ned Kelly.

Lake Eildon, officially opened by Sir Henry Bolte on 19th October 1956, remains the only inland waterway where houseboats are permitted, with over 700 current house boaters sharing the space.

SITE DIRECTOR'S UPDATE - Nov 2025

Hello everybody, I hope you are all looking forward to summer with some warmth, sun, and fun on the lake. Winter was cold and at times very windy, but it didn't produce a lot of rain.

At the time of writing our lake level sits at 55% compared to this time last year when it was at 89%. The lake and its surrounding look very different at the moment and the walk from your boat to the big shed has got a lot longer and steeper. I hope this is translating into massive calves, quads and a new level of aerobic fitness not seen for a few years now for all our members.

So, what has happened over the last 12 months?

This time last year I spoke to you all about:

• Ric and Steph leaving, a recruitment process to find a new Site Manager, and that we didn't want to just hand Jimmy a job.

- The beginning of a project to build a new maintenance shed, which had been in the planning for some time
- A plan to take the Crane Barge (our most important club asset) off the water and give it some love and attention.
- The ongoing issue of sealing the first corner of the road to the club

All of these things were important to our club being a better place (hard to believe it is possible) for our members to enjoy. Each one of these items on their own would be a big achievement in a year!

Well, I would like to give you an update on all four items in my yearly address to our members.

I would like to start with the most important item/person:

Jimmy has taken to the job like a duck to the back of your houseboats and he has "shlt it in". He has done an outstanding job in his first year. All while managing some of the biggest projects around DWBC in recent times.

The Birch family theme has continued through the year with Richard becoming the new (old) Jimmy, learning the ropes around the club and supporting Jimmy very well. I welcome and thank Richard as well. They are doing a wonderful job for our DWBC community.

Jimmy has really built on his relationships with DWBC members and members of the broader Eildon community, to really put DWBC in a strong position as a well-regarded group on the lake.

One of the last remaining things that I need to work with Jimmy to get better at is taking leave. Jimmy loves this place so much, he doesn't like to be away from it. With Richard now confident with the operations

of the club facilities AND OF COURSE after the peak period over the next couple of months, I hope that Jimmy will be comfortable enough to think about some time off.

Some of the projects that Jimmy has overseen this year have been mentioned above, so here is a further update

The Maintenance Shed

This project started out before Christmas last year with excavation and concrete works being undertaken resulting in slightly reduced carparking over the Xmas/ New Year period. It continued through the year, to the point that it is now completed. There are still things happening around site to relocate equipment and stuff from the cages and containers in the big shed and on the forecourt. Purchasing of shelving and new tools to replace VERY old ones that Jimmy and Richard are currently using. However, the shed is now functional and provides a safe and well provisioned space for work to be undertaken.

There are many members who have contributed their skills to allow us to deliver this project and to all those members I would like to say thank you.

There is still a continuing phase of this project to see the shed fulfil its complete purpose and that is the design and build of trailer accessories to assist with moving marina sections in and out of the shed and rotating them so that maintenance work can be undertaken.

I would also like to note that sections of the road above the big shed remain cordoned off reducing car park numbers by a few. The reason this remains in place is that when the original excavation was undertaken parts of the rock face were shaved. It was expected and possible that slivers of the face may fall away post excavation until the face is stable. We were expecting this to have happened with rainfall by now. However reduced rainfall has resulted in the potential for this to still occur. To be over cautious, the area will remain closed off for the time being.

Once this piece of the project is complete, we will implement a Program of Work to systematically maintain sections of the marinas. I am sure that members will easily be able to identify some sections that will be among the first pieces to be worked on.

The Crane Barge

There was a lot of planning that went into this, many services needed to be coordinated, and the timing had to be right. The water needed to be slack, and outflows had to be considered to ensure blocks or marinas didn't need to be moved.

But with great coordination and dedicated people, the crane barge

was slipped in mid-May and work began. Jimmy and Richard were assisted by Rob Dodge to pull the barge apart, through the coldest part of the year.

- First the motors which were serviced by Tony Kedell
- then the floor was taken up, the old pontoons were painstakingly cut off
- the diesel mechanics were serviced and brought into the new century (enabling greater control and functionality of the winches)
- cranes were brought in to lift the barge off the old pontoons and put onto the wonderful new pontoons built by Matt and Greg Walter
- Everything was then given a fresh coat of paint to protect it from the elements
- With no time to spare, (literally we were told that if we missed our slipping slot, the barge would be in the yard for another month) we paid the bill and got back on the water in late June.

This is a very brief description of what was a very arduous, complicated task. Again, like the shed, many members contributed their skills to help to get this project completed.

The barge is now completely renewed and is back in action and good to go for another 20 years! The crane barge is the most important

asset DWBC has, prior to this work, an assessment was carried out on it for insurance purposes, where it was deemed in need of this work before it could be insured.

Sealing of the Road

The first corner of the road to the boat club is finally due to be sealed. Works were due to commence 1st Dec however, due to substantial rain that was forecasted for early that week, GMW delayed the start until 8th Dec.

There have been many members over many years that have led the fight to have this done. All of whom should rightfully be acknowledged here.

However, I would like to specifically acknowledge Tony Rodis for this

work finally being completed. Tony and Jen relit a fire under the Shire, GMW and government departments. They set up a subcommittee of board and general club members, to get the corner sealed. However, the subcommittee

doesn't plan to rest with a sealed first corner, partitions have been written, grants sought, and politicians lobbied in an effort to get more of the road sealed.

Finally, these key projects along with the everyday maintenance items that are undertaken by Jimmy, Richard and in many instances, members, have resulted in a very busy 2025, but one that ends with DWBC in a very healthy position to ensure our club facilities meet, serve, and exceed the expectation of our members.

If anybody has any thoughts, suggestions, questions, or feedback, I am always more than happy to have a chat so please reach out. I'm happy to come visit you on your boat, or you are always welcome on mine, in the club or out on the lake.

I think the best discussions are always had with a beverage in hand on a boat deck in the sun.


JET SKI RIDE TO BONNIE DOON - 18/01/25




INAUGURAL COMMODORE'S BREAKFAST
